



SPORTS RECOGNITION POLICY



GOVERNMENT OF BERMUDA

Department of Youth, Sport and Recreation

INTRODUCTION

The Department of Youth, Sport and Recreation is seeking to ensure that sport activities in Bermuda are offered by organizations that operate in a safe and effective manner, provide high quality programming and develop their sport. The National Sport Governing Body (NSGB) Recognition Policy assists the Department in identifying and recognizing sport organizations that will meet these requirements and who can partner with the government to develop a high functioning and effective sport system.

Government has been guided by three (3) principles in its involvement in Sport, (a) the need to provide opportunities for those who wish to take part in sport and recreation; (b) the need to ensure that policies for those activities are coordinated so as to provide the facilities and programmes for maximum participation; and (c) the need to assist our sportsmen and sportswomen to fulfill their potential.

The Department of Youth, Sport and Recreation provides financial and advisory support to National Sport Governing Bodies to assist them with their sports development programmes. Department assistance is also provided to maximize sports participation and to encourage the pursuit of athletic excellence among their elite athletes.

In order to be eligible for support, all National Sporting Governing Bodies must meet the criteria within this *NSGB Recognition Policy*.

1. Definition of Sport

Sport is an activity which involves aerobic and anaerobic activity which can be structured or unstructured for the purposes of declaring a winner or simply for relaxation, personal enjoyment, satisfaction, physical health, and emotional growth and development. It will also have the following additional characteristics:

- a) It involves formal rules and procedures
- b) It requires tactics and strategies
- c) It is competitive involving two or more participants engaging for the purpose of competitively evaluating their personal performance.
- d) It requires significant involvement of muscle groups
- e) It requires trained coaching personnel with specific skills related to the activity.

2. Role of Recognised NSGBs

A NSGB is an organization that governs and administers a sport on a national basis. All NSGB's must demonstrate that it has an appropriate constitutional structure and control the environment of its sport. A recognised NSGB is responsible for the following:

- a) Promote its sport
- b) Manage the rules and regulations of its sport, including anti-doping, child protection and equality;
- c) Prepare and implement a vision and strategic plan for its sport and determine how it will be implemented locally and internationally;
- d) Implement a governance framework for its sport;
- e) Encourage and grow participation;
- f) Develop coaches, athletes, officials and participants;
- g) Organise and host competitions.

3. Definition of Recognition

Recognition is a process shared by Senior Officers at the Department of Youth, Sport and Recreation which acknowledges the status of the NSGB as a private organisation which governs a particular sport through the common consent of the sport itself. The aim of the recognition process is to identify a single lead NSGB structure which governs a sport at local and international level. Recognition criteria focus on establishing if a NSGB has achieved a position of pre-eminence within its sport and if it has a reasonable level of organisation and governance.

Department recognition of a National Sport Governing Body is not a guarantee of funding and neither does it mean that the Department have approved or accredited the quality of its programmes. The Department of Youth, Sport & Recreation will continue to work with the Association of National Sporting Governing Bodies (**ANSGB**) to develop the recognition process to ensure that those bodies that are recognised NSGBs have implemented reasonable levels of organisational and governance structures.

4. Aims, Benefits & Criteria of Recognition

Aims of Recognition

The aim of recognition is to identify sporting activities, via a sole NSGB, or via a collaborative NSGB that is organized with clear lines of communication and responsibility at the very least. The recognized NSGBs must operate at local and or international level and satisfy criteria on governance related issues and structures, as set out in the Recognition Application. The Department of Youth, Sport and Recreation will maintain a comprehensive list of recognised NSGBs and sports. The comprehensive list of recognised sports with disciplines will be updated yearly.

Benefits of Recognition

The benefits of recognition for NSGBs include the following:

- a) Obligation to regularly review governance structures and to ensure that minimum standards are compliant with the established recognition process.
- b) Clarity on the NSGB structure and how the body operates and governs its sport.
- c) Access to potential funding.

- d) Sharing of good practice and an emphasis on sporting development, which should also contribute to the quality of sporting experience for participants.
- e) Continued dialogue with the NSGBs through the annual recognition review process.

Criteria for Recognition

The following are the criteria for recognition and/or assistance by the Department of Youth, Sport and Recreation:

- a) The NSGB must be a properly constituted body with open membership, creating opportunities for all citizens and residents of Bermuda.
- b) Where there is an International or world governing authority for that sport seeking recognition, the constitution of the NSGB must be consistent with the rules of the world body.
- c) The sport meets the criteria for sport as defined in the NSGB Recognition Policy 2018.
- d) The NSGB is recognized as the sole national governing body by its International Federation and/or World Federations for all aspects of the sport in Bermuda, including its disciplines and events.
- e) The NSGB has a written constitution, by-laws and objects, including an executive and/or management structure that are democratically elected and/or voted on and adopted by the membership.
- f) The NSGB must provide financials to management at AGM to ensure fiscal obligations for the organization are met.
- g) The NSGB must be in compliance with Bermuda Sport Anti-Doping Authority (**BSADA**).
- h) The NSGB is committed to providing its members with technically and ethically sound and safe sport coaching programmes and content based on the National Sports Policy.
- i) The NSGB has a multi-year strategic plan that should identify measureable outcomes across the full range of sport development.

5. Conditions of Recognition

To be granted and maintain recognized status, a NSGB must ensure that it continues to meet the recognition review criteria which is as follows:

- a) Submission of Minutes of their Annual General Meeting to the Department.
- b) Submission of “mid-year report” discussing progress (financial reporting for NSGBs receiving a grant over \$50k)
- c) Submission of “yearend report” highlighting progress/development & financials (for all recognised NSGBs and NSGBs awarded Department grant under \$50k)
- d) Must support all Department/ANSGB initiatives (eg. Sports awards, Sports conference, NJSAP etc.)

6. Sport Recognition Process Overview

Request Application Form—Contact the Department of Youth, Sport & Recreation to obtain an application form.

Complete Application Form—Complete and send application form back to the Department of Youth, Sport & Recreation

Application Assessment & Decision—Analyses and decisions on all completed applications will be made by the Department of Youth, Sport & Recreation.

7. Application Criteria

- a) **Sporting Activity:** Provide the name of the sport and it must meet the aforementioned definition of sport.
- b) **Organisation History:** The NSGB has to have been in operation for a minimum of two (2) years as evidenced by certified or appropriately signed off accounts for the last two financial years and minutes of the last two years' AGMs.
- c) **Constitution Structure:** The NSGB shall have a constitution, show robust management and governance procedures in addition to providing a list of board members.
- d) **Affiliation:** The NSGB shall demonstrate it is affiliated to the international governing body for its sport (where it exists).
- e) **Influence:** The NSGB must demonstrate it is the leading body for the sporting activity on island. Additionally, the sporting activity must be defined by a set of rules which are accepted throughout the sport and the NSGB should be in a position to own, control or influence rules.
- f) **Membership Numbers:** The NSGB must be able to evidence a current membership level. (eg. Informed estimates, count of members, estimate based on membership fee revenue)
- g) **Sporting Development:** The NSGB must demonstrate that it has a plan for the promotion, development and levels of participation serving the entire sport, not just its membership base. Furthermore, clear pathways must be established for participants, coaches, officials and volunteers.

Additional Information (if required)

- a) **Governance Structure:** The NSGB should meet minimum governance standards and should be able to evidence statements on anti-doping, equality, complaints & possible conflicts of interest.
- b) **Organisation Vision & Development:** The NSGB should be able to demonstrate that it has clearly a clearly defined strategy for the development of its organisation and has structures in place to maintain its effectiveness as a NSGB for its sporting activity.

8. Application Decision

There are three (3) outcomes to the application process:

- a) **Approved:** Approved NSGBs will be informed of their approval status via the Department's standard letter which includes:
 - i) Confirmation of what recognition means (being part of the recognition list, existing stipulations that must be adhered etc.)
 - ii) Detail of recognition review process
- b) **Approved with conditions:** All of the application criteria has been satisfied to an extent, but additional information is required in order for the Department to make a conclusive decision on status. After additional documentation is submitted, a decision will be made on the status of the NSGB.
- c) **Not Approved:** NSGBs which are not approved will receive a rejection notification which will detail which criteria the application did not meet. Unsuccessful applicants will be permitted to re-apply the following year.

9. Sports Classifications

There shall be the following classifications categories of the sports recognition:

- a) **Category I Sports:** This category includes NSGBs whose activities are traditionally seen as a National Sport or an Olympic Sport with a competitive nature.

They must:

- i) Meet all **Criteria for Recognition** above, including all requirements of the **Definition of Sports**.
- ii) Have International or World Governing Body affiliation.
- iii) Participate annually in an international competition sanctioned by the International Governing Body.
- iv) Has a youth development program; with athletes who are competing annually internationally.
- v) Host local competitions for their sport.

- b) **Category II Sports:** This category includes NSGBs whose activities are seen as competitive, but not categorized as National or Olympic Sport.

They must:

- i) Meet all the requirements of the definition of sport and all or most of the requirements of the aforementioned criteria for recognition.
- ii) Have International or World Governing Body affiliation
- iii) Participates in international competition
- iv) Have a youth development program
- v) Host local competitions for their sport.

- c) **Category III Sports:** This category includes bodies whose activities are seen as competitive but with a recreational focus. These organizations may be rendered discretionary recognition by the Director of Youth, Sport and Recreation, upon the approval of the requirements.

They must:

- i) Meet all the requirement of the definition of sport
- ii) Meet many if not all the requirement include in the criteria for recognition.
- iii) Have a youth development program
- iv) Host local competitions for their sport.

- d) **Category IV Sports:** This category includes bodies whose activities are traditionally seen as non physical activities with a recreational focus. These National Governing Recreational Bodies (N.G.R.B) may be rendered discretionary recognition by the Director of Youth, Sport and Recreation, upon the approval of the requirements.

They must:

- i) Meet most of, if not all the requirements of the definition of sport
- ii) Meet most of, if not all the requirements include in the criteria for recognition.

10. Recognition Review

The purpose of a recognition review is designed to ensure that a NSGB should retain its recognised status. It is a condition of recognition that all NSGBs should continue to meet the recognition review criteria. The process of recognition reviews will be conducted yearly as part of an approach to ensure NSGBs are meeting standards and to provide opportunities for aspiring sporting organizations to achieve recognition status.

A recognition review can also take place at the discretion of the Department of Youth, Sport & Recreation. Listed below are situations which may lead to a recognition review being carried out:

- a) **NSGB self-declaration:** The NSGB volunteers that recognition is no longer relevant or appropriate. (Once discussed this may then move directly to de-recognition with no formal review)
- b) **Loss of international affiliation:** The NSGB no longer has membership of the appropriate World Governing Organization.
- c) **Split of a sport:** Where there is a split of a sport along discipline or organisational lines this may result in the need for a recognition review of new separate organisations.
- d) **Application from a NSGB for a sport with an existing recognized NSGB:** Where an organisation applies for recognition and there is a NSGB already recognised for the sport, this may lead a recognition review of the existing recognised NSGB.
- e) **Serious Concerns about the NSGB:**
 - i) NSGB not holding AGMs
 - ii) NSGB not responding to contact by the Department
 - iii) NSGB fails to meet conditions of recognition
 - iv) NSGB makes significant breach of its own rules
 - v) International Federation raises concerns about
 - vi) NSGB Action taken by NSGB brings the sport into disrepute

CONCLUSION

This National Sport Governing Body Recognition Policy is presented as a guide to sports organizations regarding the criteria that must be met in order to be recognized as a National Sport Governing Body by the Bermuda Government. It illustrates the criteria to be met in order to determine the sport viability and the level of support it will receive. It also advises the National Sport Governing Bodies of the standards which must be met to retain or improve their current classifications.

Sport Organizations should ensure, before applying for recognition, that they have met all the requirements for the category of recognition that they seek. It is imperative that they produce documents in conjunction with their application which confirms that they are the sole NSGB for the sport they represent and that they have an open membership available to all.
